A quilt is a marvelous thing

A quilt is a marvelous thing. One of the most treasured heirlooms that I am blessed to have inherited from my grandmother is a handmade blue and white patchwork quilt. Quilts come in as many patterns as the people who are inspired to make them: pinwheel like my Grandmother's, double wedding ring, log cabin, crazy quilts, appliquéd quilts that tell a story of the family history, etc.

My grandmother's quilt was made at a quilting bee by a group of women who came together, pooling their vision, resources and talents to create this marvelous work of art. First they had to decide on their vision: which design to use for the quilt. Then the materials were gathered: blue and white fabric, batting, needles, thread, scissors and a quilting frame. Each person contributed what they were able to give to the project. Then everyone joined in cutting the fabric into the proper shapes to be sewn together into the many squares, delineated by blue strips of cloth. Next, a batting was sandwiched between the lay-

ers and placed on the frame. Then all of the quilters painstakingly sewed the three layers together with tiny little stitches. It was bound on the edge with a blue border. The completed quilt was then given to my Grandmother to be put to use.

Over its lifetime, Grandmother's pinwheel quilt has been used for many things: a warm cover to sleep under, a picnic blanket, a comforting shawl to ward off the night's chill as Grandmother sat up at night reading, a tent suspended over the back of two chairs where the grandchildren "camped out" in the living room, etc.

I thought of that quilt last night, as the parish treasurer presented the proposed annual budget to be voted upon by the vestry. As I looked at the rows and lines of numbers designated for each of our ministries, I saw more than the mere numbers on the page. I saw a stewardship quilt. Like my Grandmother's quilt, our stewardship quilt was first the vision of our many ministry teams, who discerned together what ministry design God was calling their ministry team to this year. Then they decided what

MUST Ministries is in need of a new building to replace two old structures on the MUST Marietta campus. The goal is to replace them with one new structure having about 2,000 square feet of usable floor space, nearly the same as the St. Catherine's Youth House. A consortium of 5 churches called "Covenant Churches" is working to make this happen. They have been raising funds and building Habitat houses together for a number of years: St. Peter and St. Paul Episcopal, Mt Zion UMC, St. Ann's Catholic, The Lutheran Church of the Resurrection, and The Lutheran Church of the Incarnation. St. Catherine's and the local Methodist coalition have been invited to join them in this building for MUST.

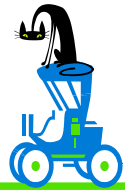
Men's Book Study

New worship opportunity: monthly Taizé service

What is TAIZÉ? Taizé is a town in France a few hours south of Paris. This town has come to be identified with the faith community founded there by Brother Roger during WWII. Brother Roger was called to provide a place of sanctuary during the war. He established there a community of faith based on service, spirituality and communion. "By its very existence, the community is a 'parable of community' that wants its life to be a sign of reconciliation between divided Christians and between separated peoples."

In Taizé, a community prayer service is part of the daily discipline. Many who have visited Taizé long to bring the spiritual mysteries of that liturgy back home with them.

St. Catherine's will hold a monthly Taizé Community Prayer Service on the third Sunday through this spring at 7:30 pm in the sanctuary, lasting approximately 30 minutes. This form of Prayer Service includes Psalms and Scripture Readings; Music; Reflection; Silent Meditation; and Intercessions. Our first service was January 16, and dates coming up are:

- February 20 – Blessings Everyday
- March 20 – Measuring Forgiveness
- April 17 – Whose Will Is It?
- May 15 – Protector and Rescuer
- June 19 – The Address

We invite you to join us in this unique and enlightening liturgy.

10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's Disease



Your memory often changes as you grow older. But memory loss that disrupts daily life is not a typical part of aging. It may be a symptom of dementia. Dementia is a slow decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills. The most common form of dementia is Alzheimer's disease, a fatal disorder that results in the loss of brain cells and function. This list can help you recognize the warning signs of Alzheimer's:

1. Memory changes that disrupt daily life
2. Challenges in planning or solving problems
3. Difficulty completing familiar tasks
4. Confusion with time or place
5. Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships
6. New problems with words in speaking or writing
7. Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps
8. Decreased or poor judgment
9. Withdrawal from work or social activities
10. Changes in mood and personality

WHY WE SING

During Advent, I'd asked the Adult Choir to be thinking about why we sing. Their responses may enlighten our thinking about why we sing or why we sing in choir.

- *Singing choral music brings me joy - it lifts me up from even the darkest mood, is often moving to the soul and can bring comfort, it brings people together from all walks of life, and is the best way I can help to share God's word.*
- *Because to me it summarizes Church. The whole becomes greater than the sum of the parts. It fills me with a sense of peace and belonging that I cannot find anywhere else. It is a gift that I freely give, yet there is no cost, no beginning nor end. It is simply there, pure love.*
- *There's a thing that happens when two or three people are singing the same notes and they are bravely singing out and at the same time listening carefully to the other. The sound is beautiful and it is completely different than the sound of one voice alone. It's not the sound of one voice or the other, it's a third sound neither one owns. It is the musical expression of Matthew 18:20 "For where two or three come together in my name, there I am with them." and John 3:30 "He must increase but I must decrease."*
- *Singing is an act of creation. How often in your day-to-day life do you get to participate in the creation of something beautiful?*
- *We have a lot of fun working together towards a common goal. Because we spend so much time together, we support one another, we laugh together, we rely on one another, we trust each other.*
- *I sing because our sons sing and I have to be able to talk with them about music.*
- *I cannot imagine life without singing, although I never wanted to make a career out of it either... I sing for physical pleasure, for the connection with words that enhances the expression of feelings and ideas, and for the discipline of technique... Choral singing is a special subset of this pleasure, because it has the added benefit of fellowship with others... Singing has also allowed me to have a modest double life, which is fun in itself. Most people at St. Catherine's have no idea what my profession is; few of my colleagues know that I can carry a tune...*

Most important I sing because I can't imagine not doing so.

- *With a piano playing Mother and a singing Father, I learned to enjoy singing early. Singing the words makes them more important, more relevant, more joyful, and more profound to me. Singing allows the meaning to touch my soul. Singing gives me great joy! When I sing I hear everything better. I love to sing!*
- *Singing is the way we use our spiritual gifts to glorify God in Music. Through song we can melt the hearts of man.*
- *I sing for three reasons: (1) To the best of my ability to make a joyful noise to the glory of God. (2) To offer music as a ministry to those in our audience. This alone provides continuity of the word of God through the only medium that is universally understood. (3) I sing because it makes me feel the spirit of God. There is no warmer feeling than when a musical chord surrounds me with all its glory in the choir.*
- *To me, singing is not just a form of praise but of prayer. Singing touches my heart and feeds my soul.*
- *Why do I sing in the church choir? Because it's the only place in church where age doesn't matter... while some tease me for being young, I don't feel like I don't fit in (especially with the basses sitting behind me goofing off every other minute). That's why I sing in choir...to always have a place where I belong no matter what my age is.*
- *Why do I sing? I enjoy it. That sounds like a bad reason, I know, but I do. Singing fills me with joy and demonstrates my feelings. God gives us all gifts, the gifts of public speaking, mathematics and the list goes on. My gift is the ability to sing and to share it to bring joy, comfort, healing and prayer. Certain songs remind me of people, experiences, situations and I am moved beyond words. Lyrics become a prayer and the music the breath.*

So, there you are. Singing is something we humans do. It is what we Episcopalians and Christians do! It means many things to many people but in the end, we do it still. 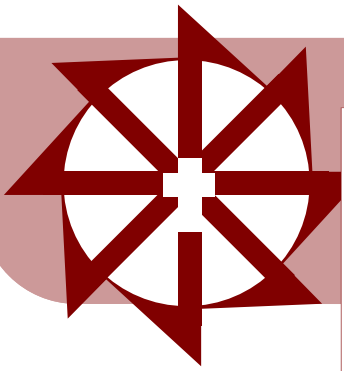

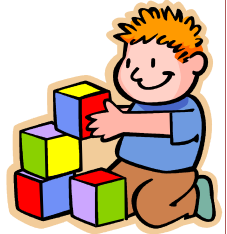
