## Christian Community

*"But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care of one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually, members of it."*

— 1 CORINTHIANS 12:24b-27

Almost five years ago I walked 400 miles across Northern Spain. Two friends of mine and I walked much of the Camino de Santiago. I'm not really a hiker, and the first invitation from my friend Anne was dismissed with a chuckle and a smile. I believe my exact words were, "Have a nice time, Anne, and let me know how it was when you get back." Once planted, though, the invitation took root in me and I decided that there was something for me in this pilgrimage opportunity. Experienced pilgrims of the Camino were quick to point out that our pilgrimage would not end in Santiago de Compostela – that's where it would begin. They were right. The Camino has become a metaphor for me and many of my pilgrimage experiences continue to teach me.

We were well into our journey and finally feeling comfortable and stronger than in

our initial days when we heard about a young woman who had died in her sleep in the auditorium-like sleeping room of one of the "refugios" along the pilgrim way. The reports said that a North American woman tried desperately to revive the 25 year old through chest compressions and mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Unfortunately, the young girl, traveling with her boyfriend could not be revived and there was much sadness and a quiet respectfulness for the fragility of life and our helplessness in the face of death. The pilgrim community was hushed and a bit more serious as we moved along our way that day. And we thought about how brave and caring was the woman who tried to revive the girl. Later we learned that our traveling companion's death was the result of undiagnosed viral meningitis. This news gave us a new appreciation for the "North American woman" who had given mouth-to-mouth resuscitation in hopes of breathing life into the dying woman. Our heroine was now in a Spanish hospital for observation in case she had contracted meningitis through her unselfish actions.

Days later we encountered a rather arrogant woman who was interested in impressing us with how much further she had walked than we had and how much more quickly she had moved along the way. Her

competitive demeanor was an irritant to us and we admittedly took some pleasure in angrily "putting her in her place" by pointing out all her short comings and her obvious self-centered nature. At breakfast the next morning we found out that she was the very person who had so selflessly given mouth-to-mouth to the pilgrim who had died. Our heroine became human and we came away from that experience a bit more humbled and not so quick to judge those we met on the rest of our journey. One never knows, does one?

The next encounter that comes to mind was with an obviously eccentric man who was traveling the Camino on a bicycle. He was filled with stories of riding across the desert of the western United States into California. What he described doing was impossible, or at the very least, improbable. In need of an extended "break" from the walking and some much needed water and a bit of food, I sat down with him and he and I engaged in a most astounding conversation about the meaning of pilgrimage. We talked about how the pilgrim community was "real church" – the church universal. We were all traveling toward a goal the best way we knew how. All of us had a unique story and we came from different places and we were longing for different things in the hope of finding wholeness – each of us missing some piece and in search of that one thing that would make us more complete in some way. We talked of the woman who died and the woman who had tried to save her and the care and concern of the pilgrim community and the presence of God so obviously reflected through the respect and support of our fellow travelers. This, we decided was what real church was all about. How wonderful it would be if the larger Christian community could see this, how much better the world if only everyone could really understand! I walked away from this conversation more aware and more appreciative of the importance of understanding what it means to embrace commonality in the midst of what appears to be diversity and I walked away astounded at the depth of a conversation which had taken place spoken literally in

four different languages. You see, neither of us spoke a common fluent language, so we spoke bits of the four languages that we both knew.

Like I said earlier, it's been almost five years since my walk on the Camino. I can honestly say that I have not seen or experienced what that eccentric man and I described as "real" church in those years - until this past weekend. My experience with the St. Catherine's youth on their January ski trip was participation in a true faith community. We are fortunate indeed to have such a caring, nurturing, supportive, compassionate group of young people among us. I am impressed beyond words. This parish, the youth leaders, the parents of these children and the children themselves are all to be congratulated on a job well done. The seeds of authentic Christian community have been planted and have produced good fruit. Congratulations!!

## MLK Concert Jan. 21 at Cathedral

The fifth annual Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Concert is 7 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 21, at the Cathedral of St. Philip.

Sponsored by the Diocese of Atlanta's Antiracism Commission, it will feature music by black composers from Guadeloupe, South Africa, Nigeria, Jamaica, and the United States from the 18th century to present.

- **January 17 and 24 —  
“Discerning What God Is  
Doing: A Study of Acts”**

"God is still speaking," the United Church of Christ currently announces in promotional and outreach materials. Another denomination, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), is entering "a season of discernment," encouraging its members to seek a deeper understanding of the will of God and how they might "embody God's purposes in and for the world." Individual congregations in all denominations compose mission statements to articulate how they seek to fit into God's plans or manifest God's concerns.

This language about God's ongoing influence and activity raises questions. In what ways can God be at work among human beings? In what specific ways does God work today, with us, in our world? How do we recognize and partner in this work? Christians propose a wide variety of answers to these questions, and this study aims to help participants think about how they, in collaboration with others, attempt to identify God at work around them. The study does not pretend to offer an exhaustive analysis of what it means for God to act or to be recognized in the actions and experiences of people of faith. Instead, it offers an exploration of selected biblical passages that prompt their readers to reflect on how they consider and expect God to be at work.

The Acts of the Apostles portrays some of Jesus' earliest followers trying to keep pace with what God is doing in their midst. In many passages these believers speak about God's activity through their explanations of what God has done and their interpretations of what God is still doing. The theological conclusions they reach are rarely self-evident. Their statements about God result from discernment declarations of faith that require an openness to God and attempt to make sense of events and people's experiences in light of convictions about who God is and how God operates. Although Acts does not prescribe a fool-proof process for how communities of faith can successfully discern God's leading, it does remind us that God's people have

always found discernment to be necessary, as well as often contentious and surprising.

- **January 31 and February 7—  
“When Church People Disagree:  
Division or Discernment?”**

Several denominations in the United States are wrestling with division, even to the degree that members are considering breaking away to become part of a different denomination. The identified trigger for schism is usually a particular issue over which there is significant disagreement. However, the process by which such issues are addressed can be a significant factor toward fragmentation. How can Christians live together faithfully in the midst of disagreement? Is there a better way to make decisions than the win/lose method of majority vote?

A growing number of regional, national, and international church bodies are taking seriously a new process for how to engage one another when significant differences exist. The process is called communal spiritual discernment, and it is a process that has been around for quite some time but proving useful in our time. The first session of this study explores the church's call to witness to its oneness in Christ and discusses how parliamentary procedure can exacerbate win/lose dynamics. The second session describes the process of communal discernment to help participants imagine an alternative to these win/lose modes of decision making. The Leader's Guide focuses more on the attitudes needed for discernment to be effective.

- **February 14 —  
“What Happened at the 2006 Episcopal  
Church General Convention?”**

The Episcopal Church U.S.A. held its General Convention in Columbus, Ohio, June 13-21, 2006. Author Greg Garrett followed the actions and discussions during the conference and provides this summary of major events and decisions.

Parishioners, please introduce yourself and make these newcomers know how welcome they are in our family.

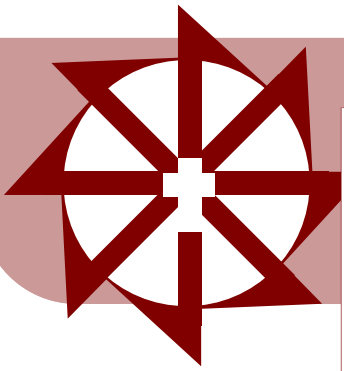
## Big Easy gets Big Help!
