

We Welcome You!

➤ Rite of Reconciliation, Confession

Come unto me all ye that are heavy laden, and I will refresh you. (Matthew 11:28)

Comfort, Refreshment, Rest. Things we all need. They are the gifts of an unburdened heart. Confessing our sins and seeking God's forgiveness frees us again to be at peace inside our own skins to be comforted, refreshed and rested. During the Lenten season and especially during Holy Week, the clergy will be available to hear confessions in the context of the Rite of Reconciliation found in our Book of Common Prayer beginning on page 440. If you wish to schedule a time for confession with one of our clergy, please call the office (770-971-2839) not later than Friday morning, April 6.

➤ A Way of the Cross for Children

We will offer a special family Stations of the Cross on Tuesday evening, April 3, at 6:30 p.m. This will be an interactive stations designed primarily to help our children experience the walk through Holy Week. For children ages 7-12, this experience will stimulate children's imaginations and help them understand what happened to Jesus. The characters in the drama of the Passion can inspire our own efforts to offer friendship, care and support to those in need. This event will help the children and parents think about God's presence and action in their lives.

➤ Easter Communions

We invite you to let us know if you will not be able to be in church on Easter Day due to illness. The Church's tradition is to bring the communion of Sunday of the Resurrection to those shut-in and unable to celebrate in the midst of the community of faith. Simply call the office to let us know.. We'll have one of our Lay Eucharistic Ministers call you to arrange for Holy Communion in your home during the following week.

➤ Flowering of the Cross

We invite all of our children to bring cut flowers to the 8:45 AM Easter morning worship service. It is our custom to flower the cross in front of the sanctuary just as the glorious worship service begins. Be sure to **bring flowers for each child** and we always appreciate some extras for children who are visiting or simply forgot theirs in the rush of dressing in their Easter finery.

➤ Prayer Vigil

Following the Maundy Thursday (April 5) liturgy everyone is given the opportunity to keep watch with our Lord before the bare altar through the night. This tradition of silent vigil kept after the last celebration of the Eucharist until the Great Vigil of Easter is customary in churches throughout the world as we begin the three day liturgy of our Lord's last supper, betrayal, trial, crucifixion, death and resurrection. Holy Week Words

For those who are new to the Episcopal Church and those not-so-new folks, I thought it might be fun to take a look at the meaning of some of the words we use during Holy week.

Triduum: A Latin word meaning a period of three days. It is found neither in *The Book of Common Prayer* nor *The Book of Occasional Services* though it is used by Episcopalians. It refers to the period beginning with sundown on Maundy Thursday and ending with sundown on Easter. It's interesting that there are no dismissals on Maundy Thursday or Good Friday as to unite the three days as one unit.

Maundy Thursday: The word "maundy" comes from the Latin *mandatum novum*, "new commandment," from John 13:34: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another." Maundy Thursday celebrates the ceremony of the washing feet (also referred to as "the Maundy") as well as the institution of the eucharist.

Good Friday: The term 'good' in reference to the day of the crucifixion is peculiar to the Dutch and English languages. The word once meant "pious" or "holy". From the earliest centuries, Good Friday was universally celebrated in the Church as a day of sad-

ness, mourning, fasting, and prayer. So, substitute the older meaning and you have "Pious Friday" or "Holy Friday."

The Great Vigil: The word 'vigil' comes from the Latin, *vigilia*, a watch, and *vigere*, to be vigorous or lively. This liturgy is intended as the first celebration of Easter. It is an ancient liturgy which was basically abolished during the reformation, the Reformers focusing all of their attention on Easter Day. In the mid-twentieth century the Great Vigil began to make its way from a small group of Anglo-Catholic parishes into the liturgical mainstream of the Episcopal Church.

Easter: The word derives from the Anglo-Saxon spring goddess Eostre. She was involved in fertility, new life, placing eggs under dying plants to bring them back to life, and she probably raised rabbits. Easter day occurs on the first Sunday after the full moon on or after the vernal equinox. In the Anglican Church this day is more properly known as the Sunday of the Resurrection.

was beginning the ordeal of these three days, he and some of his disciples went to the garden of Gethsemane where Jesus asked each of them, Will you watch with me even one hour? The disciples, we know, fell asleep. This night we have the opportunity to keep watch before the bare altar, pray, and contemplate those mighty acts Jesus endured and by which we are saved and reconciled to God. A sign up sheet is in the lobby. The watch ends with the celebration of Morning Prayer on Good Friday (April 6) at 9:00 a.m.

➤ Monastic Dinner

A simple supper of fish stew, bread and beverages will be served following the Good Friday service, prepared and offered by the Rector. We will gather in candlelight to eat and listen to spiritual readings and singing. As the evening progresses we can reflect on the Good Friday Liturgy and enjoy one another’s company. ➤ The Great Vigil of Easter, April 7

Be sure to bring your favorite and loudest bells, one for each member of your family to this beautiful liturgy!


The Great Vigil of Easter begins with the kindling of fire from which the Paschal Candle is lighted. This great candle is a distinctive feature of the Easter liturgy, leading the procession into the darkened church. The Exultet is sung. This prayer is among the oldest liturgical texts to survive to this day. The Liturgy of the Word begins in which we listen to the record of God’s saving acts in history, the witness of His continuing presence among his people, as well as in his world. We respond to each reading and then pray, silently at first, and then our prayers are gathered into a collect. The celebrant then calls us to renew


April Ministry Team Focus: Parish Life & Fellowship

The Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb to visit St. Catherine's

Wednesday, April 25, 7:00 PM

During a recent pilgrimage to Israel, St. Catherine's pilgrims established a dialogue with the Palestinian people through the Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb, Pastor of Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem, Palestine. We plan to continue this dialogue with Dr. Raheb during his visit to Atlanta this spring.

Dr. Raheb will visit us to speak on the ongoing Israeli-Palestinian conflict and the current situation in Bethlehem. As he says in his recent book, "Bethlehem Besieged: Stories of Hope in Times of Trouble," we hope his visit will promote continued awareness and dialogue as we encounter his words of hope.

Internationally acclaimed author and speaker, Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb has served as Pastor of Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem since 1998. He is the founder of the International Center of Bethlehem, Dar al-Kalima Academy for Fine Arts & Communications, Dar al-Kalima K-12 Model School, and Dar al-Kalima Health & Wellness Center, all located in Bethlehem, Palestine.

He received the 2003 Wittenberg Award and an honorary doctorate from Concordia River Forest in 2003 for his contribution to church and society. Dr. Raheb is known for

his work toward peace-making in Israel and Palestine and his dedication to creating resources that equip the Palestinian community to assume a proactive role in shaping its future. The work of Dr. Raheb has received media attention from major international media networks including CNN, ABC, CBS, and BBC. Dr. Raheb holds a PhD in Theology from Philipps University at Marburg, Germany. He is married and has two daughters.

The most widely published Palestinian theologian to date, Rev. Raheb is the author of 8 books in English and German including the award-winning *Bethlehem Besieged* (Augsburg Fortress, 2004) which received the Spirituality & Health Award as one of the 50 best spiritual books published in 2004, *I am a Palestinian Christian* (Augsburg Fortress, 1994-German, 1995-English) and *Bethlehem 2000, Past and Present* (Palmyra Publishing, 1998 English and German). His books and numerous articles have been translated in several languages.

Israel Pilgrimage 2007

Many have asked us about our trip to Israel. It was a rich and holy trip. There wasn't much of Israel that we did not explore. Many of us returned with a deeper understanding of this holy land and how it shaped Jesus ministry and the gospel of the Good News. We learned, as well, to look more closely for the Christ that resides in each of us for it is difficult to find the living Christ in the midst

of archaeological ruins no matter how fascinating they may be. While it's impossible in any article to recount experiences day by day, there are a few experiences that will forever remain in my heart as I replay the grace and beauty of this trip.

On the first day of our travels, the weather was spectacular (as it was the majority of the trip). After lunch we made our way to Mount Carmel and to the Franciscan Monastery that occupies the sight of the prophet Elijah's encounter with the prophets of Baal. (1 Kings 18:17-40) As we read the scripture overlooking the river Kishon in the valley below, we were presented a spectacular view. From this vantage point high above the Jezreel valley we were able to look to snow-capped Mt. Hermon to the north, the Jordanian Mountains to the east, the Mediterranean Sea to the west, and Tel Aviv to the south the entire width and nearly half the length of this amazing country. George, our guide, said he'd never seen a day as clear and beautiful.

A week later we traveled the Via Dolorosa in the Old City Jerusalem. After having dealt with major crowds the rest of the week, we were virtually the only pilgrims on this way of suffering that our Lord followed and we will follow again with him next week on Good Friday. Some stations are prominent with chapels marking the stop; others are small markers in obscure places on the walls of the old city. We used "everyone's way of the cross" by Clarence Enzler to mark the 14 stations. It is a powerful meditation in which Christ speaks to which there is a reply titled "I reply." I was deeply touched that as individuals in the group self-selected their readings as we paused at each station that the readings spoke profound truth of our human condition in



our small band of 16 people.

The day we visited Bethlehem we had lunch with students at Bethlehem University and ended our day with the Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb the pastor of Christmas Lutheran Church a few short blocks from the ancient Church of the Nativity. The words of the students and Dr. Raheb's words will be forever etched on my heart. As I preached on March 18, Mitri left us with this thought: that one of the world's problems today is that we have "too much religion and not enough spirituality." I take this to mean that we have too many of us worried about the rules and regulations of a structure we call religion and too few of us seeking and nurturing a personal relationship with God and in particular Jesus Christ for us Christians. God, may this not be true of us here at St. Catherine's.

Do you want to hear and see more?

Our Wednesday programs during April will give you an opportunity to see our pictures, hear our reflections, ask questions, and finally, to speak with the Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb. **On April 11 and 18** I have invited members of our pilgrimage group to make presentations to us at 7:00 pm following our meal together. Each of the two nights will be devoted to sharing our reflections and showing some of the pictures of our time in Israel.

On April 25, the Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb will join us to speak on the on-going Israeli-Palestinian conflict and the current situation in Bethlehem. As he says in his recent book, "Bethlehem Besieged: Stories of Hope in Times of Trouble," we hope his visit will promote continued awareness and dialogue as we encounter his words of hope.
