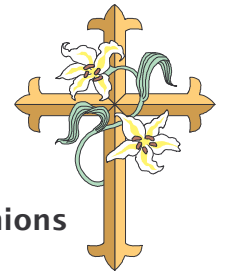

We Welcome You!

➤ **Rite of Reconciliation, Confession**

Come unto me all ye that are heavy laden, and I will refresh you. (Matthew 11:28)

Comfort, Refreshment, Rest. Things we all need. They are the gifts of an unburdened heart. Confessing our sins and seeking God's forgiveness frees us again to be at peace inside our own skins to be comforted, refreshed and rested. During the Lenten season and especially during Holy Week, the clergy will be available to hear confessions in the context of the Rite of Reconciliation found in our Book of Common Prayer beginning on page 440. If you wish to schedule a time for confession with one of our clergy, please call the office (770-971-2839) not later than Friday morning, April 14.

➤ **A Way of the Cross for Children**

We will offer a special family Stations of the Cross on Tuesday evening, April 11, at 6:30 p.m. This will be an interactive stations designed primarily to help our children experience the walk through Holy Week. For children ages 7-12, this experience will stimulate children's imaginations and help them understand what happened to Jesus. The characters in the drama of the Passion can inspire our own efforts to offer friendship, care and support to those in need. This event will help the children and parents think about God's presence and action in their lives.

➤ **Easter Communions**

We invite you to let us know if you will not be able to be in church on Easter Day due to illness. The Church's tradition is to bring the communion of Sunday of the Resurrection to those shut-in and unable to celebrate in the midst of the community of faith. Simply call the office to let us know.. We'll have one of our Lay Eucharistic Ministers call you to arrange for Holy Communion in your home during the following week.

➤ **Flowering of the Cross**

We invite all of our children to bring cut flowers to the 8:45 AM Easter morning worship service. It is our custom to flower the cross in front of the sanctuary just as the glorious worship service begins. Be sure to **bring flowers for each child** and we always appreciate some extras for children who are visiting or simply forgot theirs in the rush of dressing in their Easter finery.

➤ **Prayer Vigil**

Following the Maundy Thursday (April 13) liturgy everyone is given the opportunity to keep watch with our Lord before the bare altar through the night. This tradition of silent vigil kept after the last celebration of the Eucharist until the Great Vigil of Easter is customary in churches throughout the world as we begin the three day liturgy of our Lord's last supper, betrayal, trial, crucifixion, death and resurrection. A Visit to New Orleans

Last weekend, Paul Parisi, Barbara Perry, Dale Schlenker and I traveled to New Orleans on behalf of the Vestry of St. Catherine's. Our mission was to visit and explore a partnership with the clergy and people of St. George's Episcopal Church in New Orleans. It was, to say the least, an eye opening experience.

Many have asked about the trip and about our experience. I have yet to find an adequate way to respond to their questions especially concerning what we saw of the hurricane damage. The best I've been able to do is to say that if I were able to adequately describe the scene most reasonable people would assume I am exaggerating. I have never seen such widespread loss! We spent hours on Saturday visiting various neighborhoods in the city including the lower 9th ward and never saw a house or business that was not damaged. We visited some 5 Episcopal Churches and there was not one that did not suffer major damage including in one case the possibility that their building will be torn down. What I was most impressed with and proud of is the presence that the Episcopal Church — the Diocese of Louisiana, individual congregations and Episcopal Relief and Development — have in the city. It is clear that as a

church we are making a difference and leveraging this time into an opportunity to make long term improvements in the life of the people of New Orleans.

We spent Saturday afternoon with the Vestry of St. George's. What impressed us the most about their leadership is their decision to see this time as an opportunity. They said that they could choose to turn within and conserve resources in order to survive or they can choose to turn outside themselves and generate resources to serve the people of the city and to thrive as a congregation. We were impressed. We worshiped together on Sunday and found them to be remarkably similar to our community of faith.

We believe there are some opportunities for us to offer the people of St. George's our help and encouragement. We will continue to discern where our gifts and abilities as a people intersect with their needs as a community. The visiting team will make a presentation to the Vestry at 7:30 PM on April 18. Our presentation will include recommendations for initial steps and activities.

In the meantime please keep the people of New Orleans and the congregation of St. George's Episcopal Church in your prayers.

was beginning the ordeal of these three days, he and some of his disciples went to the garden of Gethsemane where Jesus asked each of them, Will you watch with me even one hour? The disciples, we know, fell asleep. This night we have the opportunity to keep watch before the bare altar, pray, and contemplate those mighty acts Jesus endured and by which we are saved and reconciled to God. A sign up sheet is in the lobby. The watch ends with the celebration of Morning Prayer on Good Friday (April 14) at 9:00 a.m.

➤ Monastic Dinner

A simple supper of fish stew, bread and beverages will be served following the Good Friday service, prepared and offered by the Rector. We will gather in candlelight to eat and listen to spiritual readings and singing. As the evening progresses we can reflect on the Good Friday Liturgy and enjoy one another's company. ➤ The Great Vigil of Easter

Be sure to bring your favorite and loudest bells, one for each member of your family to this beautiful liturgy!

The Great Vigil of Easter begins with the kindling of fire from which the Paschal Candle is lighted. This great candle is a distinctive feature of the Easter liturgy, leading the procession into the darkened church. The Exultet is sung. This prayer is among the oldest liturgical texts to survive to this day. The Liturgy of the Word begins in which we listen to the record of God's saving acts in history, the witness of His continuing presence among his people, as well as in his world. We respond to each reading and then pray, silently at first, and then our prayers are gathered into a collect. The celebrant then calls us to renew

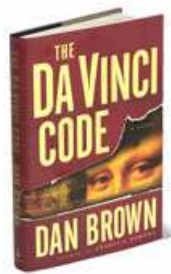

Wonderful Wacky Wednesdays

Easter, 2006: *The Da Vinci Code*

Dan Brown's *The Da Vinci Code* is a popular book that engages us in many ways including religious themes. Enormously popular (and enormously unpopular in certain circles), it is a fast paced, romantic thriller whose characters are bent on solving a mystery, along with revealing an ancient secret. The book has been criticized by



scholars and church leaders as misrepresenting history — as being untrue. It has been enjoyed by many others as a story, perhaps by touching on some allegorical truths despite the rhetorical spin toward a specific message.

During the Great Fifty Days of Easter (April 16 - June 4, 2006) we will study this fascinating book. Using a variety of resources (books, papers, and DVD's) we will wonder together about the "truth" of the story and draw our own conclusions as a group and as individuals. We will meet following dinner each evening from April 26 through May 24 to plumb the depths and intrigue of this novel. We will also take the time to see the movie (premiering May 19) after we have studied the book. As a group we'll determine a time when we can attend together. This will give us the opportunity to view this best-selling story through several senses. If you haven't read the book or want to re-read it in the next couple of weeks (it's a page turner) this would be a good time to get started.

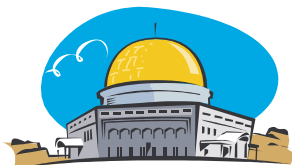
The Good Friday Offering

Since 1922, Episcopalians have supported the ministries of the Episcopal Church in Jerusalem and the Middle East through the annual Good Friday Offering. In his annual Epiphany letter, Presiding Bishop Frank T. Griswold has asked that Episcopalians continue to pray for their sisters and brothers in the Holy Land and to support the Good Friday Offering as an opportunity to demonstrate solidarity with Anglicans and all Christians in that troubled region of the world. For the past 84 years the Episcopal Church has taken up a Good Friday Offering to be sent to the Episcopal Church in Jerusalem and the Middle East, symbolizing unity with and passionate concern for those who witness to Christ throughout that region.

The Province of the Episcopal Church in Jerusalem and the Middle East covers an enormous area: the whole southern Mediterranean coast from Algeria to Lebanon and Syria, and down to the Persian Gulf and the Horn of Africa. Yet it is one of the smaller Provinces of the Anglican Communion in membership. Outside of the Holy City the countryside is overwhelmingly Islamic and Jewish, and even in Jerusalem the dominant Christian traditions are Greek Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Armenian Apostolic.

However, Bishop Riah Abu El-Assal maintains a visible Anglican presence in the Diocese of Jerusalem - which includes Israel, the Palestine National Authority, Jordan, Syria and Lebanon - and his sister dioceses of Egypt and North Africa, Cyprus and the Gulf, and Iran are equally involved with numerous ministries throughout the region.

Support received through the Good Friday Offering translates into operating hospitals, schools, orphanages and many other programs, accomplished for the benefit of all people in the province, Christian, Jewish and Muslim alike.

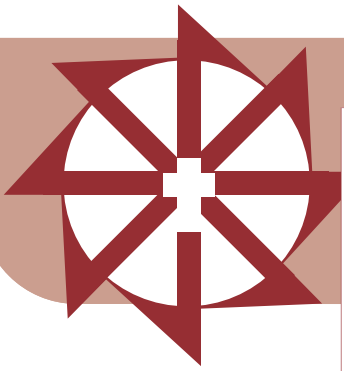
