The Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb to visit St. Catherine's

Wednesday, April 25, 7:00 PM



During a recent pilgrimage to Israel, St. Catherine's pilgrims established a dialogue with the Palestinian people through the Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb, Pastor of Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem, Palestine. We plan to continue this dialogue with Dr. Raheb and expand it with the congregation and our community during his visit with us.

Dr. Raheb will visit us on April 25 to speak on the ongoing Israeli-Palestinian conflict and the current situation in Bethlehem. **Please invite friends and neighbors to attend.** The evening is free of charge, the nursery will be open and a program for elementary age children will be available.

Internationally acclaimed author and speaker, Rev. Dr. Mitri Raheb has served as Pastor of Christmas Lutheran Church in Bethlehem since 1998. He is the founder of the International Center of Bethlehem, Dar al-Kalima Academy for Fine Arts & Communications, Dar al-Kalima K-12

Model School, and Dar al-Kalima Health & Wellness Center, all located in Bethlehem, Palestine.

He received the 2003 Wittenberg Award and an honorary doctorate from Concordia River Forest in 2003 for his contribution to church and society. Dr. Raheb is known for his work toward peace-making in Israel and Palestine and his dedication to creating resources that equip the Palestinian community to assume a proactive role in shaping its future. The work of Dr. Raheb has received media attention from major international media networks including CNN, ABC, CBS, and BBC. Dr. Raheb holds a PhD in Theology from Philipps University at Marburg, Germany. His books and numerous articles have been translated in several languages.

Mystery Painting

You might have noticed a new addition to the sanctuary. The new painting that is hanging over the side altar is called “The Protection of Saint Joseph” and was given to St. Catherine's by a group of parishioners who bought it at the Valentine's Dinner Dance in February. The painting came to be in the auction from an art dealer in Atlanta who loans art to auctions on consignment.

“The Protection of Saint Joseph” was painted by Peruvian artist Diana Mendoza. Mendoza was born in Junin, Peru, and graduated from the Escuela Nacional de Bellas Artes with the highest award in the specialty of Painting and Drawing and as Professor of Painting. She has participated in several exhibitions throughout South America and has gained popularity in the United States and Europe in the last decade.

Our painting depicts Joseph holding the infant Jesus and is in the style of the Italian Renaissance. Portraiture, particularly religious, was a common artistic theme during

the High Renaissance and Mendoza's painting reflects that style both in technique and appearance. “The Protection of Saint Joseph” is oil on canvas and is framed by an antiqued gold frame also consistent with Renaissance style. While the style of the painting clearly reflects Mendoza's ability to paint in the style of the Renaissance masters, the subject, Joseph and Jesus, is quite unique. Religious art has traditionally depicted Mary holding the infant Jesus to stress the relationship between Jesus and his human mother in counter-perspective to his heavenly father. Many images of Mary and Jesus can be found all forms of art created over the last two thousand years. Images of Jesus and Joseph without Mary are rare, if not altogether a contemporary phenomenon. “The Protection of Saint Joseph” allows the viewer to see the unique image of Joseph holding and protecting the infant Christ and portrays the often overlooked relationship between Jesus and his earthly father.

Reflection on our Israel Pilgrimage

Israel is a cross roads. It is a segment of the path humanity followed as our ancestors traveled out from the Horn of Africa into the rest of the world. It is an intersection of major religions. God called Abram from modern Iraq, opposite to this migration to settle this land. Today, Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Bahaism are all here in this place which has seen tremendous hope and tremendous conflict for millennia. We who traveled here in early March now have our perspectives to share.

The area we traveled is small, 40-miles E to W by 120-miles N to S. The area where Christ taught is even smaller. During our visit the weather was mostly clear, but there had been rain and we saw green except in the desert near the Dead Sea. There were lush valleys, but the hill sides are covered with rocks and the fields and pastures are lined with rocks removed over the centuries. We saw snow atop Mt Hermon at ~9,000 feet elevation, but much of the country is near or below sea level with olive trees, date palms, citrus trees, banana plantations and other semi-tropical foliage.

Much of Israel is modern, but there are nomadic Bedouin Arabs who still live and dress and exist as their ancestors did in Christ's time, following their herds of sheep and goats which, in turn, follow the grass.

Our guide, George Fellemon and Father Jim read appropriate scripture as we traveled. Each evening, while relaxing with cocktails, we met to review the day's highlights and share our impressions.

Our first night was spent on the Mediterranean Sea shore at the city of Netanya. The next morning we traveled to the ancient port of Caesarea to see ruins of a castle built by Herod the Great in which the Apostle Paul was imprisoned for 2-years before being sent to Rome. We then traveled inland to Megiddo located on the edge of the Jezreel Valley. This hilltop commands the valley and was strategically important to control those migrating from Egypt to Europe or the Middle East. In 10,000 years, 25 different civilizations were built, one on top of the other, at this place. Megiddo is the site of the first recorded war—a battle with the army of an Egyptian Phar-


ah. This area is reputed to be the place called Armageddon in the Book of Revelation, the place where the last battle will be fought. A little later we drove up into the Mt Carmel area to look down on Megiddo and the Jezreel Valley. Below us in the distance was a military air base from which an F-18 took off and flew almost straight up until it disappeared. The sound of this modern-day chariot coupled with knowledge of Iranian nuclear ambitions was a chilling beginning to our Pilgrimage.

What else did we see and do on this Pilgrimage? It's difficult to summarize. We renewed our Baptismal vows in the headwaters of the Jordan River about 3-miles from the border with Lebanon; we repeated our marriage vows at a church in Cana where Christ changed water to wine; we celebrated the Eucharist on the shore of the Sea of Galilee near the Church of the Primacy and the place where Christ is believed to have fed the 5,000; we visited the Mount of the Beatitudes where Christ gave the Sermon on the Mount and the City of Capernaum; we saw Mt Nebo where God showed Moses the Promised Land; we visited the cave where Elijah is said to have lived and saw where Elijah defeated the prophets of Baal; we drove across the Golan Heights on the West Bank to a UN security point and looked into Syria toward Damascus, only 25-miles away; we visited Masada and some of us hiked down the Snake Trail from the top; we saw the cave where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found and visited the Shrine of the Book at the Israel Museum in Jerusalem; some swam in the Dead Sea; we visited Bethlehem and Nazareth and the Mount of the Transfiguration; we walked down the Mt of Olives and Celebrated the Eucharist in the Garden of Gethsemane; we prayed at the West Wall, we visited the Dome of the Rock, we walked the Via Dolorosa and did the Stations of the Cross ending at the Church of the Holy Sepulcher and the sites of the Crucifixion and the tomb. I missed a few of the stops we made, and of course a much fuller description/discussion of all of these visits could be given.

It is impossible to fully describe the impact this Pilgrimage has had. Certainly, the Garden of Gethsemane and the Stations of the Cross were highlights, but each day and each individual sight had a contribution to my evolving understanding. Through this visit I have become more aware of my personal selfishness and more aware of the

We also became much more informed about the on-going conflicts in this part of the world. You can hear much more about this during the next few weeks. We saw school classes on field trips who by law are always accompanied by armed guards, we saw active military reserve who must always carry their weapon, we passed through military check points and 20-foot high cement walls built to isolate Palestinians in a way very similar to the ghettos described at Yad Vashem – the Israel Holocaust Memorial we visited in Jerusalem. I encourage you to listen to all who made this trip, and I look forward to any questions you may have.


