Watching with hope

I have watched our General Convention at work in Columbus, Ohio these past days with great interest, abiding hope for our communal life together, and no small amount of concern. I have not been there and therefore not subject to the full range of conversation and emotions. And so I will not draw any conclusions about the quality of the work they have done. While others have and will, I assume the work of the General Convention will take some time for us to engage and live into. And so I will give it some time.

What I am dismayed with, however, is the quality of the conversation. I find it disheartening to listen to the extremes in the conversation they have had concerning the Windsor Report. This is not about the liberal or the conservative extremes. I think they are equally wrong in the way they approach this conversation. What is called for, in my opinion, is a bit more humility. I, too, long for clarity in my life but I've grown comfortable with the reality of life that leaves me with more questions than absolute answers.

Our Presiding Bishop in addressing a rare joint session of the House of Bishops and House of Deputies said on Wednesday morning:

Humility is not an easy virtue but it is very much required in this season. Humility

requires at times a stance of restraint in order that something larger can happen. There are times when what may appear to be a step backward may be called for in order to go forward.

The need for this humility does not stop at the General Convention or the Episcopal Church as a whole, but includes the entirety of the Anglican Communion and those within it who (again in the words of our Presiding Bishop):

may be opposed to expressions of restraint, which would make it more difficult for them to justify their apparent need to establish a separate ecclesial body. Nothing would better serve such purposes than to be able to say that we, because of our action or inaction, have chosen to walk apart from the rest of the Communion. In a strange way, those with very different views are able to vote on the same side of the question.

I claim no easy answers to these difficult questions. I do, however, claim a love for my church and the Anglican Communion and it is important to me that we remain a part of a worldwide communion. Why? Because it is far easier to walk apart than it is to walk together. And the brokenness of our world (in some way) demands that we witness to the hard work of reconciliation.

Again our Presiding Bishop:

When I became your Presiding Bishop eight and a half years ago, I called the church to the costly discipline of conversation. At that time I pointed out that the word conversation and the word conversion come from the same Latin root. I said that to enter into conversation deeply, and with an undefended heart, opened the way to conversion. By conversion I did not mean one point of view capitulating to another but rather a new way of seeing one another and recognizing Christ in one another. The conversion of which I spoke had less to do with a change of mind and more to do with a change of heart.

Throughout this entire debate at General Convention I have been reminded of the words of Paul to the Corinthians:

...we know that all of us possess knowledge. Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but any one who loves God is known by him. (1 Corinthians 8:1-3)

I hope we can honor those among us who call us to live most fully into the loving embrace of God at his table of fellowship **and** honor those who hear that call to a loving embrace differently than we do at this time in the history of God's kingdom. But surely a healthy dose of humility and a willingness to accept that we don't have all the answers will be a prerequisite to our building up the Anglican communion in love. And to do so each of us will need to set our private agendas aside no matter what they may be.

Presiding Bishop Elected

The Episcopal Church, 30 years after it allowed women to become priests and bishops, has elected a woman as its Presiding Bishop. Katharine Jefferts Schori, 52, bishop of Nevada, was elected on the fifth ballot June 18...

The 26th Presiding Bishop-elect will be the first woman to hold the top post in the church's nearly 400-year history. Her nine-year term officially begins November 1; she will be invested and seated November 4 during a liturgy at Washington National Cathedral. She will succeed Presiding Bishop Frank Griswold. An airplane pilot and former oceanographer, Jefferts Schori addressed deputies and visitors who gathered in the Columbus Convention Center in both Spanish and English. She thanked the other nominees and emphasized her passion for mission. She also offered a vision of reconciliation and actualization of the reign of God.

The Presiding Bishop-elect's vision to lead the church comes out of the prophet Isaiah's vision of the reign of God and includes such United Nations Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) as eradicating poverty and hunger. "The poor are fed, the good news is preached, those who are ostracized and in prison are set free, the blind receive sight," Jefferts Schori said June 18 during a news conference following her election.

...The Presiding Bishop is the key leader in articulating the vision and mission of the church, and assessing its work, as well as advocates for social justice in this country and in the world. The Presiding Bishop "will lead us into the reality of a multicultural church," the committee said. As our chief pastor, the Presiding Bishop is our chief preacher and liturgical leader, and oversees the pastoral care and spiritual wellness of bishops. The Presiding Bishop is a leader in the Anglican Communion and in this role takes the title of Primate, from the Latin for leader. The Primate works to improve the human condition and works toward the reconciliation of all persons as we live out the Gospel.

Mission

"Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being? We will, with God's help. Amen"

Justice: Fairness or reasonableness, especially in the way people are treated.
Peace: Freedom from war or conflict, to be calm or silent.

Sitting at my desk trying to write about mission opportunities in the Episcopal Church I find myself asking what mission work really is. On the Episcopal Church website there is a section called "Life and Work of the Church" and under that heading is a drop down tab labeled Mission. Thinking that it would be a relatively simple task for a Tuesday afternoon to click on the tab and find out everything I ever wanted to know about mission work in the church, I clicked on it.


It wasn't so simple. The first heading under Mission reads "Justice and Peacemaking" and after clicking on the tab I find a reference to our Baptismal Covenant. Will you "Strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?" I think back to every baptism service I have attended and say in a quiet voice "I will, with God's help." The words on the screen are far from what I expected to find, yet they lead me to think about the idea of mission in a new light. I had always thought of "mission work" as going overseas and spreading Christianity, but this speaks of justice, peace, and reconciliation. I had never thought of mission as being related to our Baptismal Covenant.

My first thought is that justice and peace are very different things and that justice has a lot to do with law and judgment and not a lot to do with peace. I ask myself how we strive for both justice and peace. Justice for whom I ask, and how do we live into being Christians while doing justice? How do we do these things while also respecting the dignity of every human being? By saying

"every human being" we are not saying Episcopalians or Christians. "Every human being" is not based on faith or race or income, "every human being" is not conditional. Micah 6:8 calls us to "do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with our God" but what is doing justice? To me, justice is a fair, even-handed, and unbiased approach to a person or situation.

As Christians we must do justice while loving and respecting the people we are doing justice to and must be able to walk humbly with our God in the process. How do I do that? I ask myself, and what does mission have to do with justice and peace? How are mission trips occasions to live into our baptismal covenant? In a few weeks a small group of us will travel to Mississippi to do clean up work from Hurricane Katrina. While there we will live into our Baptismal Covenant in many ways. By being Christ's hands at work in the world we will love our neighbors and we will be doing justice to the people of Long Beach by serving them. While there we will probably have times when we are hot and tired and are thinking more about a shower than about justice and peace, but it will still be happening. Looking again at the church website I am amazed by how many organizations exist to combat injustice in the world, to fight hunger and disease and poverty, and to better the lives of others no matter who they are, what they believe, or where they live. These groups throughout the world and trips like the one to Mississippi define what "mission work" really is. When doing this work there are times when we will be hot and sweaty and discouraged and it is then that we keep going because we know that it is our call and that we will do it, with God's help.
