We had a great summer meeting on Sunday. It was well attended and the information shared once again focused on the many vital ministries we share together here at St. Catherine's. I hope you were able to attend, if not, I hope you will ask someone about their perceptions of the meeting.

The Vestry has for some time talked about the many ways we keep the congregation abreast of what's happening at St. Catherine's. The proposal of an interim summer meeting was one of those suggestions. I think it gave us the opportunity to talk about programming at St. Catherine's at the time of year when people are considering their involvement in the congregation and what they will be doing as we return to a fall schedule. The meeting was well attended by an enthusiastic crowd. We'll certainly add it to our schedule next summer.

Some of the key points I heard in the presentations were:

- Catechesis of the Good Shepherd continues to grow in its formation of our children ages 2-1/2 through 12 years of age. We offer a variety of offerings throughout the week. We are becoming a "flagship" congregation to which others will come to be trained and to experience how we go about executing this wonderful formation.

- Our youth programs are thriving under the able leadership of Amelia Snider. Her vision is to continue to embrace our youth in their journey to adulthood providing them the life skills that will continue to make them valuable members of the faith community. Amelia's vision is to add to our programming a Sunday afternoon/evening program for building community and providing fellowship amongst our youth.

- We are experiencing the "normal" summer slump in our operating budget. Our income is behind some 3% of the budgeted income (see the financial update on page 6). We're not worried about this but do ask that if you are behind in your pledge that you take the time to get caught up as we enter the busy time of fall programming.

- The Faithful Mission campaign is gearing up for their kickoff on September 16. Be sure to sign up for some of the limited spots we have for this exciting event. The purpose of this campaign, Nelson Gale reminded us, is to pay down debt so that the operating budget has sufficient resources to continue to fund and expand our programs. Without this campaign the entire debt load must be carried by the operating budget which will mean reductions in programming.

Reflections on the New Orleans Partner Parish Trip

Spiritual Lagniappe by Ginny Lummus

In New Orleans there is a phrase Lagniappe (*lahn yop*). It is French for something extra. Over my four days in this still flood-scarred community, I found myself receiving many "extras" through conversation and action. I was deeply touched by the people I met and the things our group did.

As we drove in on the first day, I found myself completely overwhelmed. I had never seen a natural disaster of this magnitude before. As we drove along I-10 in New Orleans, we saw mile after mile of abandoned homes, and it appeared as if we were looking at a ghost town. Every home along this stretch had a water line that surrounded the house much like a bathtub ring. Each flooded home also had an eerie cryptic message spray painted on the side letting others know about which rescue team searched the house and what they may have found inside or on the property. By this time I am wondering what difference it is that I will make in a city that still has over 155,000 homes to repair and many living in deplorable conditions.

The next morning we headed to Grace Episcopal Church where we met Deacon Quin Bates. He was our diocesan liaison who took us to the lower 9th ward where we handed out water and supplies. He reminded us why we were there and to be listeners. "Ask them how they are doing," he said. "You'll find that many people want to tell you their story." So off we went. Our post was an abandoned Walgreens parking lot. As we pulled up there were a few people under the shade of a tree on a very hot and humid day. While setting up, a large 18-wheeler pulled in and a medical mission organization began to set-up shop and provide medical care to anyone who needed it. What appeared to be a ghost town the day before became a thriving community. Many people stopped by and many more shared their stories. One gentleman in particular touched us St. Catherine's folks. He told about his evacuation to Austell. While sharing his story, his admiration and love for the people and schools of Cobb County was palpable. He wanted to stay in Georgia but family-duty called and he returned to "gut" his mother-in-law's home in order to be able to sell it. He ended his time with us by blessing us and we were blessed. Not just by him, but by all those who came that day.

What I have found during my time in New Orleans, both by working in the lower 9th ward and handing out meals at the Dragon Café, is to be appreciative for what I have. In the blink of an eye it could all be gone. This time was a turning

point in my life and a profound blessing. Hopefully in the months to come you will be able to support this powerful ministry and experience some of your own spiritual lagniappe!

Stewardship of Time

Life doesn't seem fair. One person is born to a family with money while another starts in relative poverty. A few have sparkling skills or remarkable physical appearance. Regardless of how we've each been graced, however, everyone is blessed with the same 24 hours each day, 7 days each week. It's how we use time that makes a difference.



Time management has been discussed many books and articles. Good students, professionals and entrepreneurs all need time management skills to be successful. After all, whatever skills you have can be put to best use when you know how to manage your time. The techniques are standard: make a list of things that should be done, prioritize the list, and keep and review a journal of how you actually use your time. It's a way to improve your time management skills.

My dictionary defines "steward" as a person who manages someone else's property; "stewardship" is the act of serving as a steward. But it's my time, not someone else's, isn't it? Christ identified two major priorities: Love God with all our heart, all our mind, and all our soul; and Love our neighbors as ourselves. When I think about it, following these priorities requires giving my time to God and my neighbors.

Giving my time away! How do I know how much to give? Does that mean I should TITHE my time? Ten percent of a week is 17-hours! Maybe an "after tax" perspective would deduct time for sleep; perhaps 11-hours a week.

How much time do you actually donate? Why not keep a journal and find out—time for prayer, time for church and bible study, time given to others. Do you tithe, and if not, how could you get closer? Ask God to help with your priorities. The time you spend praying about this counts too.

Looking for a few good men and women

Every couple of years, Saint Catherine's Stephen Ministry recruits and trains people from our congregation to become Stephen Ministers. We are now identifying our new class of trainees this fall. A Stephen Minister undertakes 50 hours of training to equip him or her to provide one-on-one, medium- to long-term care for people who are dealing with a crisis or otherwise difficult time in their lives.

Does the idea of becoming a Stephen Minister seem daunting? If you think it does, just reflect on these simple questions:

- Have you ever shown up at the funeral of someone that you might not have known that well, just to show your support and care for the family?
- Have you ever let a family member, friend, or co-worker "pour their heart out" to you, and all they needed was for you to be a good listener?
- Have you ever sat quietly at the bedside of a friend who was sick, not necessarily saying anything, but allowing your presence to say everything?

And perhaps the most important question on which to reflect is:

- Has anyone in your life been that caring and supportive listener when you were in need?

Stephen Ministry is looking for a few men and women who want to make a difference in someone's life by simply showing up, listening, and caring. A daunting task? Well, those who have not only been a Stephen Minister, but who have also had a Stephen Minister to lean on, can attest that it is far less daunting as it is eminently rewarding. A Stephen Minister is equipped to give so much to someone who is in need of a caring friend but the blessings that are returned to the Stephen Minister are astounding. As any trained Stephen minister will testify, this ministry is indeed life changing!

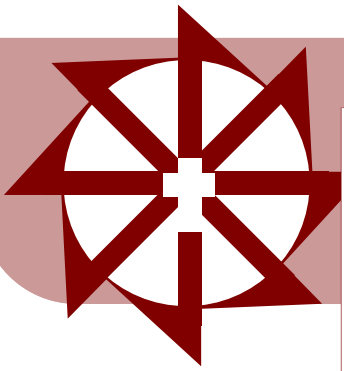
In about a month, September twenty second to be exact, I will be leaving for Denver Colorado to be a part of a three month long Discipleship Training School that will prepare me for a two month long mission outreach somewhere out of the country.
