



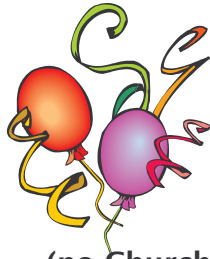

## Perfecting Our Faith through Giving

### Just a note of caution

*We have had occasional problems over the years with money being taken from the church building, and just want to remind you not to leave purses, wallets or other valuables unattended when you are attending a service or a meeting at the church. It does happen but not often, thankfully.*

Faith is a personal response in genuine gratitude to the grace of God. It is a relationship of trust, loyalty, gratitude, and affection. And the more Joan and I intentionally look at the abundance in our life the more our faith is perfected. Each year as we receive our pledge card we do two things. First, we take stock of our life. How is God a part of our lives and for what are we grateful? We believe that all that we are and all that we have comes from God, but that belief requires us to look at our lives, individually and together, with intentionality. Second, we decide how we will give sacrificially to God's work through this community of faith. Neither of us will ever achieve a perfect faith! We do know, however, that we can continue to perfect our faith through a genuine gratitude to God embodied in giving to the church.

This community of faith shares in a life of abundance. Our staff and their work, our educational programs, our liturgy and music, our fellowship opportunities, and our generous outreach programs each represent abundance given by God. However, this abundance does not exempt

us from very real challenges in 2006. If we fail to face these challenges with a significantly increased level of giving then we will be faced with decisions that will change our community in ways that none of us will appreciate. These challenges are outlined in the Stewardship brochure that you will be given along with your pledge card at our Cottage Meetings. When you receive your invitation to the Cottage Meeting in the next few days I pray that you will respond with the kind of commitment that characterizes the ministries of this congregation. I ask that you take the time to attend the meeting, engage the conversation, read and discuss the case statement with one another.

I ask you to give sacrificially to St. Catherine's out of a deep gratitude for this community of faith and its impact on its people, the community, the nation and the world. Rather than asking you to give until it hurts, I ask that you give out of a genuine gratitude to the grace of God as manifested through the people of this congregation.

Bishop Mokiwa has graciously agreed to come to St. Catherine's on **Sunday, Oct. 16** as part of his trip to the US, to share his experiences and his ministries with African Christianity. Bishop Mokiwa will preach at both services, teach, and spend time educating us on God's work in the lives of our brothers and sisters in Tanzania. Bishop Mokiwa is coming to the States to begin setting up a formal diocesan companion relationship with the Diocese of Arizona. This is a followup to a visit in early 2005, when he met with officials at the national office of the Episcopal Church, along with Bishops and church members in various dioceses. Our own Bishop Alexander visited with Bishop Mokiwa this summer on his way to the Diocese of Central Tanganyika.

The Diocese of Dar es Salaam is a diocese in the Anglican Church of Tanzania. The Universities Mission to Central Africa and the Church Missionary Society began work in 1864 and 1878 at Mpwapwa. The Province was inaugurated in 1970 following the division of the Province of East Africa. The nineteen dioceses represent both evangelical and Anglo-Catholic Churches.

## Children's Solemn Communion



This fall many of our children prepared for Solemn Communion. Episcopalians are welcome to receive communion from the moment of Baptism and many of these children have long been taking communion, so the logical question is: why would we prepare them for it now?

Now, between first and fifth grade, something is happening in their moral development. When they come to the rail as little ones, they come with the understanding that Jesus is feeding them in a special way. This is enough and it is appropriate. Little children are invited into relationship with God at the level of joy, protection, and unconditional love. Communion is part of that. As adults, we approach the rail differently. We are aware of the actions that we have done throughout the week that have separated us from God and our neighbor and before we go to the rail we make our confession of sin and are given forgiveness. We approach the table with things made right and we take comfort in the fact that we are forgiven and we are fed.

Between those two stages, early childhood and adulthood, something happens: the conscience is born. The Holy Spirit begins to speak to the child about right and wrong, internally, in a language not of words, but of feelings. And when the child does something wrong, even if no one witnesses it, even if they will never be found out, they know that they have turned away from God. The Holy Spirit tells them so. Before the age of six this does not happen without external assistance. But soon after this age the child becomes spontaneously aware of what we call sin. They feel a new thing: guilt. And, even if it is never given a name, they are aware of it. It is uncomfortable and it makes the child feel apart from God for the first time.

All of this occurs without the prompting of an adult. Even in a family where sin and guilt have never been mentioned, the conscience is very much awake and functioning and the child feels the weight of things done and things left undone. And this is where the preparation for Solemn Communion comes in. It is as much a preparation for reconciling with God as it is anything. It is a means to maintain the relationship between God and the child as one of love. And now new elements are added, those of reconciliation, forgiveness, and celebration of that return to God.

The children have heard parables that reassured them of Jesus' desire to be in relationship with them—abide in me—they have heard about blocks that make it difficult for us to abide in Him, and they have talked about searching them out and asking God to take these blocks away. They have heard the parable of the Prodigal Son (what we call the Forgiving Father in Catechesis) and quickly understood that it is God's welcoming them back with open arms. And last, they heard about the faith of the Centurion who said that if Jesus said the servant was healed, then he was healed indeed. These words that Jesus spoke guide the child through the process of returning to the Father without fear or lingering doubt. They know that they are forgiven and that they can continue in relationship with the Father just as before.

In preparing for Solemn Communion the children have reaffirmed their baptismal covenant, they have gotten to know Father Jim and Sherry, they have had the Rite of Reconciliation, and in celebration of all of this they will make a Solemn Communion with a new understanding of God's love for them.

Many thanks to everyone who has brought and continues to bring food, toiletries, boxes and other items for distribution to Katrina victims, who have assisted in transporting those items, and who have donated through Episcopal Relief and Development. Our plan is to provide long-term support to those who have come to our community, knowing that this will be a long term commitment.

- St. Catherine's is a drop-off site for food for M.U.S.T.
- We will collect food and other items every week on the following schedule:
  - 1st Sundays (Oct. 3, Nov. 7, Dec. 5): Non-perishable food items
  - 2nd Sundays (Oct. 9, Nov. 13, Dec 11): Baby supplies
  - 3rd Sunday (Sept. 18, Oct. 16, Nov. 20, Dec. 18): Toiletries
  - 4th & 5th Sundays (Sept. 25, Oct. 23 & 30, Nov. 27, Dec. 25) Linens & pillows, new and gently used.
- There will be a Red Cross Blood Drive here at St. Catherine's on Monday, October 24.
- We are investigating the possibility of joining with other churches in our convocation to "adopt" a family, assisting and providing them with all they need to re-settle here in Cobb County.
- We are interested in partnering with a parish in the Katrina affected area and assisting in whatever ways we can, which may include rebuilding.

## Vestry receives Capital Gifts Feasibility Study

The Vestry has received the report from Sinclair Townes and Co. on the feasibility study for the capital gifts campaign. We thank you for your participation and heard what you said.

We have decided to delay the capital gifts campaign until next year. Many of you stated that starting a new campaign this year was too soon because you had not finished paying your pledge for *Faith Builds!* We also heard from our Finance Committee Chairman, Mikel Parker, and our Treasurer, Chuck Zimmerman, that the outstanding contributions to *Faith Builds!* along with money budgeted in our

Operating Budget in 2006 should cover our annual debt obligations next year. Our construction loan will convert on May 1, 2006 to a mortgage.

There will be a Capital Gifts Campaign in 2006. The money is needed to meet our debt obligations during fiscal year 2007 and beyond. It is needed as well to free up Operating Budget funds for mission and ministry. You will be hearing more about this in the first quarter of 2006. As a Vestry, we invite your questions and comments as we proceed to finalize plans for this important campaign.

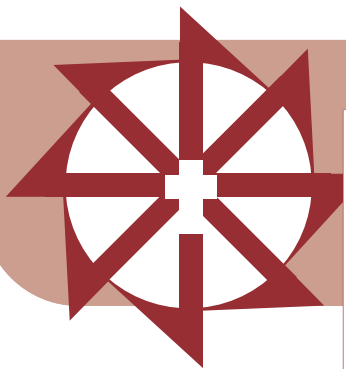
