

Gift Giving

Just before our St. Catherine's women left for Borderlands Retreat Center last June, a dear friend of mine asked to meet with me. At our meeting she gave me a traditional Native American gift of sweetgrass and tobacco. These sacred gifts came wrapped up in cloth squares which could later be used for prayer tie offerings. As she handed me this beautiful, aromatic gift, she said, "Remember that when our Native American brothers and sisters give something, it becomes entirely yours to do with what you will."

"What wonderful words," I thought to myself, "almost as good a gift as the sweetgrass." Then I began to think of my gift giving and how often I give something with expectations somehow attached to the gift. Will the recipient of my gift understand the real meaning of the gift? Will it be placed in some prominent place for all to see? Will they wear it often and perhaps let it become some kind of personal "trademark"?

Then I thought of the times I was disappointed to find that my gift had been set aside or admired briefly and then delegated to the bottom drawer or the shelf in the closet. I became aware that, for the most part, my "gifts"—my "gift giving" had strings attached.

Right now, I am reading a new book about Mother Teresa. It's called *Come be My Light*. In spite of the very bad and misleading press this book has gotten, I am profoundly touched with this story. You see, as a young girl, Sister Mary Teresa vowed to "never deny Jesus anything." She gave to God the gift of herself. She became God's gift to do with as He pleased—no strings attached. I thought about this as we moved through our Epiphany liturgy.

I thought about it again last Sunday as we celebrated the Baptism of our Lord. Jesus, God incarnate, entered the waters of the Jordan river to offer Himself as gift to the community—no strings attached.

Stewardship: 2008 budget approved

The Vestry approved our 2008 budget at the Vestry meeting on January 15. The \$702,000 budget represents a 3% increase over the 2007 budget. The budget is primarily supported (90%) by your pledges for 2008. We want to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their commitment for 2008. The following is a summary of our results to date:

They have committed as well to inviting us into a year round focus on stewardship and we'll look forward to hearing from them in the coming weeks.

Each year St. George's, New Olreans raise money during Mardi Gras by offering meals to the public. Funds go to their Dragon Café ministry which provides meals every week to needy people in the neighborhood. An Invitation to a Holy Lent

Ash Wednesday, Feb. 6
Holy Eucharist + Imposition of Ashes
at 7:00 am, 12:00 noon, 7:30 pm

On Ash Wednesday we are signed with the outward sign of our humble beginnings and common end. The priest invites all to the observance of holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. After our period of silence before the Lord, our maker and redeemer, the priest puts ashes on our foreheads as we take responsibility for this living flesh, notice everything around us, the possessions we hold valuable, the persons we love and know that all will one day turn to dust.

Lenten Morning Eucharist and Study

Our Tuesday morning Lenten Eucharist and Study will begin on February 12 at 7:00 am. We meet for a quiet and brief Eucharist followed by a study. We're done by 8:00 and on to the day's demands. For those who have participated in this time over the years we have found it to be special, a time we look forward to as an opportunity to respond to the invitation to a holy Lent. Our study will be Psalm Meditations for the Church Year. Each week we will reflect on the Psalm appointed for the following Sunday. Liturgies during Lent

The Great Litany Feb. 10, 8:45 & 11:15 services

On the first Sunday of Lent we sing the Great Litany. The Great Litany is an intercessory prayer including various petitions sung by the priests, with fixed responses by the congregation. It was used as early as the fifth century in Rome. It was led by a deacon, with the collects led by a bishop or priest. The Litany was the first English language rite prepared by Archbishop Thomas Cranmer and first published in 1544. Its use in church processions was ordered by Henry VIII when England was at war with Scotland and France. It was printed as an appendix to the Eucharist in the 1549 Book of Common Prayer (BCP). The 1979 BCP titled it "The Great Litany," distinguishing it from other litanies in the Prayer Book. The Great Litany may be said or sung. The officiant and people may kneel or stand, or it may be done in procession.

Rite1/Rite 2 in Lent

Lent 2008 will introduce some liturgical changes within our Sunday worship. These changes will primarily center around the Eucharistic Liturgy and the language and prayers we use each week.

Let's talk about our language. During Lent the 7:30 and 11:15 worship will use Rite I rather than Rite II. The easiest distinction we might draw between the two is that Rite I uses traditional language (thee, thou, thy, etc) versus Rite II which uses contemporary language (he, you, our, etc.). The traditional language rites are known as Rite 1, and the contemporary language rites are known as Rite 2. The Rite 1 liturgies reflect the language and piety of the Elizabethan era and the first Book of Common Prayer (BCP), although the structure of these liturgies also reflects the influence of modern liturgical scholarship. The Rite 2 liturgies reflect more fully the influence of the liturgical movement and contemporary theology. Rite 2 liturgies tend to reflect greater sensitivity for inclusive language issues.

The music we will use will follow the same structure. The Hymnal 1982 provides service music settings that are designated for Rite 1 and Rite 2 services. There is nothing to suggest that a Rite I liturgy is more "holy" than a Rite II liturgy, it is just a matter of preference and/or a desire to reflect the rich heritage and diversity of the BCP. It is for this reason that we'll use Rite I at 7:30 and 11:15 am during Lent.

Let's now talk about our prayers. In both Rite I and Rite II we have a selection of Eucharistic Prayers that we may use, labeled Prayers I and II in Rite I, and Prayers A, B, C, and D in Rite II. At 7:30 and 11:15 we will use Eucharistic Prayer I at both services. This is an ancient prayer of the church finding its shape in the earliest (4th century) celebrations of the Eucharist. The text of this prayer in our current BCP is from the Scottish rite dating from the 17th century. While the language has changed some in its current form, this prayer is in the same basic form as on the day Samuel Seabury agreed to bring it to the American prayer book as the "price" he paid to be consecrated bishop in Scotland. When we pray it we can rejoice in its ancient words and our continued links to the body of Christ throughout the centuries.

During our 8:45 am service we'll use Rite II, Prayer C. Like many of the ancient Eastern churches' prayers, Prayer C contains much congregational response which is largely words from Scripture. The prayer was drafted for the 1979 BCP by Capt. Howard E. Galley. It is often nicknamed the "Star Wars" prayer because of its rich creation imagery. In addition ths prayer reminds us that we do not come to the table week in and out "for solace only" but that we come to be strengthened for service in Jesus' name. It reminds us that we do not come "for pardon only" but to be renewed and sent back out into the work to do ministry. The prayer reminds us of the Old Testament drama of God's continuing effort to draw His people back to Himself. The recital of salvation history reaches its climax in the proclamation of the incarnation and atonement.

We hope in making these changes during Lent you will be introduced to the rich diversity of our liturgy and that you will find some new dimension of your faith enriched.

God: Yes.


