The people of St. Catherine's seek to share in the love that Jesus Christ has for us and the world by welcoming, accepting, nurturing, and serving all people through the power of the Holy Spirit.

We Welcome You!

The preparations for our observance of the Paschal mystery of the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ as a community of faith are well underway. The following is just a snapshot of those preparations and where you can help us.

- **Palm Sunday Readers**

We need 8 people (total of 16) to participate in the Passion Gospel at our 8:45 or 11:15 am services on Sunday, March 16. You will read a small part while standing at your seat. This is an opportunity for parishioners who are not already lay readers to be involved in reading in the church (lay readers are welcome to sign up as well). - **Easter Flower Donations**

Each year we ask you to contribute to the cost of decorating our sanctuary for the Easter celebration. Our flower guild works hard to always make Easter Day a special time in our worship space. They have some very good ideas to make a beautiful celebration of the resurrection. You will find brown envelopes in the pews for your check or cash. **Please return your envelope by March 9** and be sure to let us know how you want your donation remembered, in memory or thanksgiving for a loved one, for our Easter bulletins.

- **Rites of Reconciliation**

The clergy of St. Catherine's will again offer the opportunity for private confession (The Reconciliation of a Penitent) during Holy Week. During Lent we are called to a ministry of forgiveness. Holy Week is a great time to explore the areas in our own lives where forgiveness would be appropriate. Confessions are not restricted to times of

sickness. They may be heard anytime and anywhere. This liturgy is found in our Book of Common Prayer, pages 446-452, if you are interested in exploring this sacrament. The Reconciliation of a Penitent is available for all who desire it. The Anglican tradition has always been that all people can avail themselves of this sacrament, some should, but none must. If you want to explore this sacrament including simply inquiring about it, please contact Fr. Jim for an appointment during Holy Week.



- **Prayer Vigil**

"Then he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, So, could you not stay awake with me one hour? Stay awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

Our custom is to keep Vigil with our Lord through the night from immediately following the Maundy Thursday (March 20) liturgy until Morning Prayer on Good Friday (March 21) at 9:00 AM. The sign up poster is in the foyer. Please stop by and find a half-hour or hour period of time you can sit in prayer with Christ in his passion in the garden at Gethsemane. We will have security in the building through the night. Won't you spend one hour with your Lord?

From our new Associate Rector

Greetings from Blairsville! Roy and I are getting excited about our move to St. Catherine's and can't wait to meet you all. We have already met the St. Catherine's vanguard in the form of the transition committee and so have begun the getting to know you process. They have bent over backwards to make us welcome and to try to meet our every need. For this and their warm hearts we are deeply grateful. We find that we already have mutual friendships with some of the body of Christ at St. Catherine's in Ann and Tom Sneed and Gail and Walter McGill, and I wouldn't be surprised if there are more.

Still, introductions might be helpful. I am a late vocation priest and have served two parishes in the diocese of Atlanta since my ordination in 1997: three years at Holy Innocents, Atlanta, as assistant rector and almost eight years at St. Clare's, Blairsville, as rector. Prior to ordination, I was a full time Mom, taught music for nine years and was an elementary school media specialist for three years. My husband, Roy and I celebrated our 38th wedding anniversary this past December. Any of you who have moved in recent years have an inkling of what we are going through right now: getting our house ready to go on the market, looking for real estate in Marietta (sticker shock), saying goodbyes to the folks we have grown to love in this corner of God's vineyard and seeking to continue serving St. Clare's faithfully for the rest of our tenure here. Thankfully, these transitions have a finiteness to them. March 30th will be my first Sunday to worship with you and to begin learning some of your customary before Father Jim and Deacon Kathy go on vacation.

On Pilgrimage with St. Catherine's

During our 2009 Pilgrimage to Egypt and Jordan we will visit Bethany beyond Jordan where many now believe the baptism of Jesus took place. For centuries the 20 sites identified from the Jordan River to Wadi Kharrar and eastwards to Wadi Gharahah formed stations along the pilgrim's route from Jerusalem to the Jordan River and finally to Mount Nebo. That itinerary commemorated places associated with the lives of some of the greatest prophets, including Moses, Joshua, Elijah, Elisha, John the Baptist and Jesus Christ. The exact place of Jesus' baptism is not known and is assumed to have occurred in the Jordan River at or near the site now called *el-Maghtas* in Arabic. Whether Jesus entered the water from the east or west banks of the river when he was baptized by John, and whether his 40 days of wanderings in the wilderness (desert) occurred east or west of the river, remain very much debated today.

John the Baptist's settlement at Bethany is now well identified, as are a string of associated sites marking the sacred nature of the area east of the river. The primary evidence for Roman and Byzantine era sacred and secular structures associated with the baptism of Jesus and the mission of John the Baptist now appear to be clustered mostly on the east bank. The evidence from Byzantine and medieval days also indicates that this tradition was the dominant one since the days of the Baptist.

We will visit many of these sites as we make our way north to Amman after our visit to Petra. Join us on this exciting trip March 13-24, 2009. Brochures are available on our resource table. We will be scheduling a informational meeting in April for all those who want to learn more about this exciting trip.

Ministry Survey Results and Next Steps

In December, the UPWARD steering committee asked some 90 leaders of the congregation to take a survey from the perspective of their membership on a ministry team or committee. The purpose of that survey was to identify ways to strengthen and improve the ministry of St. Catherine's as the Body of Christ. The Vestry met in January to review the results of the survey under the guidance of our consultant, Rev. Trawin Malone. Based on those results we identified areas of strengths as well as areas for growth in how our ministry teams work together. The Vestry went to their winter retreat with the task of writing goals for this coming year based on the data generated from the mutual ministry review survey. Here is what resulted from our time together.

How We Talk

(Improved communication to newcomers, community and congregation)

- To effectively communicate with members of St. Catherine's in a timely, appealing, clear and consistent manner so that each member can understand when and what the ministries are doing.

How We Work Together

(Ministry structure and function)

- To provide a scheduling process to eliminate scheduling conflicts so that people are given the opportunity to participate in a fair and timely manner.
- To discuss with ministry teams their adding a public relations function to convey information to newcomers and the congregation, and to improve communication between the ministry teams.

How We Get/Stay Involved

(Ministry of invitation)

- To design, develop, and implement a "shepherding" program to pair each newcomer with a member of St. Catherine's to get the newcomer involved in a ministry of their choice.
- To develop a system to identify and ask current members to be a part of a ministry.

You'll hear more about these goals and the tasks needed to accomplish them in the coming weeks. If anyone is interested in being a part of this process, please contact myself, Al Jones or Fr. Jim Nixon.

Did you know..?

Did you know that the loose plate cash from the alms basin on the first Sunday of every month is designated for the Clergy Discretionary Fund? What's a discretionary fund? The discretionary fund is designated by Episcopal Church canon law "to be applied to such pious and charitable uses as shall be thought fit by the Member of the Clergy." This means this fund is used to pay to fill gas tanks of travelers who need help; purchase food gift cards from Kroger for the hungry; pay electric bills for those who are about to lose power; pay water bills for those who will lose their water; to help members of this congregation avail themselves of retreats and educational trips; to help with rent for

a family; and to help a family move into more permanent housing. In the past the Outreach Ministry Team has supported the fund with a portion of our outreach funds but as the needs outside the congregation demand more of us this has not been possible. Therefore the fund's reserves are at the lowest point in many years just at a time when the need for charity continues to escalate.

So when the alms basin is passed around on the first Sunday of the month we invite you to consider throwing a little extra cash in it for the Clergy Discretionary Fund. Please be generous. The community in which we reside we certainly appreciate your generosity.

Easter is when??

Easter is early this year, on March 23. Easter is always the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring Equinox. This dating is based on the lunar calendar that Hebrew people use to identify Passover, which is why it moves around on our Roman calendar. Easter can actually be as early as March 22. You'll find a table for determining the date in our Book of Common Prayer, page 880.

Here's the interesting info. This year is the earliest Easter any of us will ever see the rest of our lives! Only the most elderly have ever seen it this early (95 years old or above!). And none of us have ever, or will ever, see it a day earlier!

1) The next time Easter will be this date will be the year 2228 (220 years from now). The last time was 1913 (if you're 95 or older, you are the only ones that were around for that).

2) The next time it will be the day earlier will be in 2285 (277 years from now). The last time it was on March 22 was 1818. So, no one alive today has or will ever see it any earlier than this year!

Worshiping Together (Part 2)

During this season of Lenten discipline it seems a good time to remind ourselves of some of the courtesies that enhance our worship experience. These observations are based on the following premise:

Worship in the Episcopal Church is not simply adoration or praise of God, but taking part in the redemptive actions of God in Christ in human history. Each week we retell the story of God's willingness to intervene in history on our behalf. In our worship, God speaks to us through the Bible, through prayer, and through our actions together, reminding us of God's love for us and calling to us to join in the redemptive work of reconciling the world to God.

Our joining together "in the redemptive work of reconciling the world to God" is enhanced when we make a commitment to one another to observe certain courtesies of worship. Unfortunately, the reverse is equally true, when we cannot or will not

observe these courtesies, the experience of worship is diminished for all.



1. As worship begins, sing and respond!


Ours is a common worship meaning that the liturgy is the work of the people – not just the celebrant and altar party. Worship is not something done to you. Worship is something we do together! The Lord calls us to make a joyful noise! A previous music director often reminded us that we are invited to sing "every Sunday in church like it [means] something to [us]." We may not be Josh Grobin or Andrea Bocelli, but we can still "sing from our heart" and "make a joyful noise unto the Lord."

2. Please refrain from entering or leaving the sanctuary once the service has begun.

There are times when such movement is more appropriate. Those times are indicated by an asterisk in the bulletin. Please be especially respectful of our readers, intercessors, choirs, and preachers by not leaving or re-entering when they are reading, presenting an anthem, or preaching.

3. Bring along a soft or quiet toy for your children.

Children are always welcome – indeed, encouraged – to be a part of our worshiping community. Feel good about having your child beside you and encourage them to participate by cluing them to what will happen next in the worship service. Even adults get bored, we just hide it better. Bring a soft or quiet toy for your child to use when they, too, get bored.
