

#### • A Way of the Cross for Children

We offer a special family Stations of the Cross on Tuesday, March 18, at 6:30 p.m. This is an interactive Stations designed to stimulate imaginations and help our children experience the walk through Holy Week. The characters in the drama of the Passion can inspire our own efforts to offer friendship, care and support to those in need. For children ages 7-12, this experience will help them understand what happened to Jesus, and encourage both children and parents to think about God's presence and action in their lives.

#### • Easter Communions

We invite you to let us know if you will not be able to be in church on Easter Day due to illness. The Church's tradition is to bring the communion of Sunday of the Resurrection to those unable to celebrate in the midst of the community of faith. Simply contact the office to let us know. We'll have one of our Lay Eucharistic Ministers call to arrange for Holy Communion in your home during the following week.

#### • Flowering of the Cross

We invite all children to bring cut flowers to the 8:45 AM Easter morning worship service. It is our custom to flower the cross in front of the sanctuary just as the glorious worship service begins. Be sure to bring flowers for each child and we always appreciate some extras for children who are visiting or simply forgot theirs in the rush of dressing in their Easter finery.

## Random thoughts on Holy Week

I recall that when I was in elementary school, "Spring Break" was called "Easter Vacation." For my family, this was a time to relax and prepare for Easter Day. My family was Presbyterian so we did not formally observe Good Friday. I knew about Good Friday, though, and watched with interest as my Catholic neighbors in Arlington Heights walked to Mass in observance of this holy day. Usually my Grandmother would visit from Topeka. She would set up the sewing machine in our dining room and work on a special dress for me to debut on Easter morning. We would dress up and go to church and then join the neighbors for a 5-family picnic and Easter Egg hunt in someone's back yard. Our neighbors didn't go to our church. Each family worshiped in different places, but we all gathered for the egg hunt and food—lots of food. It's what we did on Easter Vacation. As far as I knew, that's what everyone did on Easter Vacation.

In my youngest son's junior year in college, "Spring Break" did not include Easter Sunday. Jeff commented that he was surprised to learn that "everyone" was not going home over Easter weekend. Many of his friends were actually pretty surprised that he was going home. I remember feeling

saddened that things had changed so much. No longer is Easter recognized as a "common" celebration. The language in our society is changing and with it, perhaps, recognition of our religious commonalities. We are focused more and more on what unifies us at a secular level and less and less what unifies us at a spiritual level.

As Christians, Palm Sunday begins our journey through Holy Week. I find that the St. Catherine's community observes this time with depth, thoughtfulness, and integrity. Our week will include remembering Jesus' grand entrance into Jerusalem and his trial; remembering our brokenness and God's invitation into healing; remembering our call to be servant to others; remembering Jesus' walk to the cross and his death. We will wait and pray in front of the vacant altar during the dark hours of the vigil and then celebrate the glory, brightness, and promise of the certainty of a *LIVING* God who dwells with us.

Our challenge this week will be to break away from the secular world—which appears to have lost the language and the understanding—and move through this *Holy* week with intention and awareness so that we might rediscover its deeper meaning.

## Worshiping Together

**PART 3** — As we come to the end of this season of Lenten discipline it seems a good time to remind ourselves of some of the courtesies that enhance our worship experience. Our joining together "in the redemptive work of reconciling the world to God" is enhanced when we make a commitment to observe certain courtesies of worship. Unfortunately, the reverse is equally true, when we cannot or will not observe these courtesies, the experience of worship is diminished for all.

**1. Take time to quietly answer questions from your children about the worship experience.** Someone mentioned to me that they had seen a parent working with their child to participate in our worship on a recent Sunday and how touching the scene was to them. Perhaps consider discussing worship at home to prepare

children for any departure from the routine, such as baptisms. Children love to act out life encouragement and allow them to "play church" and use these times as times to reinforce "church" behavior.

**2. Express your gladness at having everyone at worship, especially our children and young adults.** Be sure to welcome those near you. Include them in your greetings during the Peace and in conversation after the service to let them know they belong.

**3. Communion is a particularly good time for quiet reflection.** The Communion hymns are intended to reflect the themes of the day and to encourage individual reflection. Enjoy them by singing them and turn them into prayers for your additional spiritual nourishment. This is an inappropriate time for discussion with friends and family. We often hear from the congregation that this is a particular problem at St. Catherine's.

Easter liturgy, leading the procession into the darkened church. The Exultet is sung. This prayer is among the oldest liturgical texts to survive to this day. The Liturgy of the Word begins in which we listen to the record of God's saving acts in history, the witness of His continuing presence among his people, as well as in his world. We respond to each reading and then pray, silently at first, and then our prayers are gathered into a collect. The celebrant then calls us to renew our baptismal vows.

Now at last into its final part, the Holy Eucharist. This special Easter greeting begins the Eucharist. *Alleluia, Christ is risen! The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia.* Here bells are rung and the joyful sounds are made. For the first time since the beginning of Lent a joyful song of praise is sung. The bells are rung to celebrate the great news of Christ's resurrection. The people celebrate the victory of their King who has triumphed over sin, death, and the powers of darkness. The light of Christ! We end the evening with a small and quiet reception that gives us a foretaste of the joy and celebration the next day.



### • Rites of Reconciliation

The clergy of St. Catherine's will again offer the opportunity for private confession (The Reconciliation of a Penitent) during Holy Week. This liturgy is found in our Book of Common Prayer, pages 446-452, if you are interested in exploring this sacrament. The Anglican tradition has always been that all people can avail themselves of this sacrament, some should, but none must. If you want to explore this sacrament including simply inquiring about it, please contact Fr. Jim for an appointment during Holy Week. Confessions are not restricted to times of sickness. They may be heard anytime and anywhere.

### • Prayer Vigil

Our custom is to keep Vigil with our Lord through the night from immediately following the Maundy Thursday (March 20) liturgy until Morning Prayer on Good Friday (March 21) at 9:00 AM. The sign up poster is in the foyer. Please stop by and find a half-hour or hour period of time you can sit

in prayer with Christ in his passion in the garden at Gethsemane. Please sign up for the time you desire even if others have already signed up. We will have security in the building through the night. Won't you spend one hour with your Lord?

### • Monastic Dinner

We will gather after our March 21 Good Friday service for an adult monastic dinner in the Parish Hall immediately following the liturgy. It serves to break our Good Friday fast as we come together in silence and candlelight to enjoy fish stew, bread, and a little wine or other beverage. As the meal progresses it is always a delight to hear the room move from silence to a solemn joy as we anticipate the rest of the story of the death and resurrection of Christ. We will offer some reflective music and reading as we share the meal. Look for the Opportunity for Ministry in your bulletin to sign up and join us.



### • Easter Egg Hunt

The annual Easter Egg Hunt will take place immediately after the 8:45 am service on Easter Day. There will be two egg hunts, one under the great oak for children in Young Lambs and Level I Catechesis, and one behind the church on the playground for children in Level II and Level III Catechesis. The youth group will be helping to hide the eggs beginning at 8:15am before the 8:45 service and will help the younger children look for eggs during the hunt. Please bring donations of eggs and candy to Amelia's office by Good Friday. You may leave candy and eggs separate, and no peanut candy, please! If you would like to help facilitate (supervise the youth) or have any questions please contact Amelia. Thanks!

## St. Catherine's has a library?



Yes, we do, and it contains books ranging from children's

story books to church history. It is conveniently located in the same wing of the building as the Parish Administrator's and Youth Director's offices. It includes a conference table, a large television, and a number of comfortable chairs.

The illustrated story books for very small children include Bible stories and lessons about life values. They are perfect for bedtime reading. There are also Bible study books for teens and adults. Included in this section are teaching aids for children of all ages.

The library has books on parenting, caregiving, spirituality, prayer and meditation, and theology/philosophy. You will find a shelf devoted to C.S. Lewis and another for books that address the interests, concerns and needs of women.

Numerous versions of the Bible are found in one large section that includes several resources to help us research, read and have a better understanding of the complexities of the Bible and biblical times. There are large maps to help physically locate the great stories of Scripture.

There are books about caring for aging parents, dealing with death, addressing addictions, and learning about cancer. There is a small section for fiction and one for public policies.

Donations of books appropriate for the church library are welcomed. Simply leave the books in the library behind the door with a note about who is making the donation. Checking out books is also simple, and there is no limit. There is a sign-out sheet next to the door.


Go take a look. You might find a book that would interest you.

## Diocese gains assistant bishop

The Diocese of Atlanta will soon welcome an assistant bishop. The Rt. Rev. Keith B. Whitmore, bishop of the Diocese of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, has accepted an invitation from Bishop J. Neil Alexander to become the Diocese of Atlanta's assistant bishop.

Whitmore, 62 and a priest for 30 years, will take on his new role "as soon after Easter as possible," said Alexander. "It will take a while to arrange a move and get settled." Whitmore was ordained bishop of

Eau Claire in 1999. He is a Wisconsin native and a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, and Nashotah House, Nashotah, Wis. He has served congregations in Wisconsin, Missouri and Kansas, where he was dean of Christ Cathedral, Salina, and he serves as a trustee for the Berkeley Divinity School at Yale. He and his wife, Suzanne, have been married 41 years. They have two grown children.

"I am delighted that Bishop Whitmore will be joining us in the Diocese of Atlanta," Alexander said. "In our years together in the House of Bishops, I have come to deeply respect Bishop Whitmore for his integrity and his principled way of engaging the full life of the church. ...He will be able to join me in leading the mission and ministry of this great diocese." ...

## CONGREGATIONAL NURSES CORNER

### Stroke Warning Signs

The American Stroke Association says these are the warning signs of stroke:




- Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body
- Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding
- Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination
- Sudden, severe headache with no known cause

If you or someone with you has one or more of these signs, don't delay! Immediately call 9-1-1 or the emergency medical services (EMS) number so an ambulance (ideally with advanced life support) can be sent for you. Also, check the time so you'll know when the first symptoms appeared. It's very important to take immediate action. If given within three hours of the start of symptoms, a clot-busting drug can reduce long-term disability for the most common type of stroke.

**Dial 9-1-1 Fast — Heart attack and stroke are life-and-death emergencies — every second counts. If you see or have any of these listed symptoms, immediately call 9-1-1.** Not all these signs occur in every heart attack or stroke. Sometimes they go away and return. If some occur, get help fast! Today heart attack and stroke victims can benefit from new medications and treatments unavailable to patients in years past. But to be effective, these drugs must be given relatively quickly after heart attack or stroke symptoms first appear. So again, don't delay — get help right away!
