Why Stewardship?

Our Stewardship 2009 ingathering continues. We are asking each and every household at St. Catherine's—whether you've pledged in the past or not—to consider making a pledge to our budget in 2009.

Why stewardship? Clearly, the world's economy is stark. All of us recognize that we come to this season in challenging economic times. While we talk about the abundance of God's blessings, the economic numbers paint a picture quite the opposite. Families are worried about jobs, gas prices and prices overall. Listening to the 24 hour news quickly challenges any sense of abundance we feel in our spiritual lives and in this community of faith. There is a tension between our sense of abundance and the world's sense of scarcity.

Why stewardship? Yes, we must develop and support an operating budget that is \$702,000 in 2008. Yes, we must fund salaries for staff members who work tirelessly but are now concerned about the security of their jobs like many of you. Yes, we must fund programs that nurture our children's faith, walk with our youth on their journey to adulthood, spiritually feed our adults as they face the world's

November 5 - 9



Hallows evening

Since early childhood, I have loved Halloween. As a little girl I loved dressing up in costume and trick-or-treating and now I enjoy seeing the children as they go house to house for treats. Sadly, there has been a recent trend among some well-intentioned Christian people to prevent their children from participating in the annual fun of Oct. 31st because of the holiday's pagan roots. These folks may not be aware that there are Christian connections associated with this day which have integrity and purpose.

The name *Halloween* is Old English for the evening before All Hallows Day (*Hallow's Eve*), better known today as All Saints, on Nov. 1. The Christian feast of All Saints was established by Pope Gregory III in the 8th century as a celebration of the lives of the faithful men and women of history who have died, who serve as examples to us of Christian living. We remember the names of those near and dear to our hearts in the roll call of saints on All Saints Sunday.

Before this Christian observance, in the British Isles ancient Celtic Druids associated these days with the beginning of the new year (lighting bonfires to the sun god) and the spirits of the dead. When Romans conquered Britain, some of the Druid customs were combined with the Roman Samhain (summer's end) on Nov. 1. They believed that evil spirits created havoc and mischief on the eve of Samhain, so Roman

Celts would put on frightening costumes of animal skins to keep them away.

When Christianity spread through the Roman empire, it often assimilated local customs into the faith. Fires were lit on Halloween in honor of the Christian departed. Prayers and gifts were offered in churches for the repose of souls. Later, in 17th century Ireland, peasants began going from house to house on Halloween asking for money for their All Saints feast. Christian-influenced Halloween became a time of remembrance, fun and gaiety.

Halloween traditions traveled to America with immigrants. Costuming to ward off evil spirits has combined with 17th century Irish house visits to give us the now-familiar costumed children seeking candy, a very recent 20th century development. Lighted pumpkins survive from the old bonfires in honor of the dead. Parties with games for adults and children continue to add fun to the season.

All Hallow's Eve and All Saints Day are times to remember the saints we have loved, who have died and are now alive in Christ. Halloween has an honorable Christian association with these remembrances of All the Saints. That is why I believe that Christians should not have a problem with Halloween, but should enjoy the fun. I don't intend to give up observing this holiday.

challenges, and reach out to build shelter, feed the hungry, and educate. As Juan Sandoval reminded us last weekend, we must be good stewards of the facilities God has given us by heating and cooling, providing lights, and repairing. All of these are good enough answers for "Why Stewardship" but not THE answer.

Why stewardship? THE answer is we "do" stewardship because God first loved us and stewardship is our response to that love. Giving our time, talent, and treasure to the Church and to other worthy organizations is a manifestation of love for God and a desire to say thank you. As we become more aware of God's blessings our response is thanksgiving. Stewardship is that journey of becoming more aware of God's abundance in our life.

We ask your prayers and support in the coming weeks. As of October 19 we have received 86 pledges for \$376,536, compared to 123 pledges for \$460,362 at the same point last year. Your Vestry has prepared a vision for our life together on our website. Your Vestry is committed to budgeting only after receiving the commitments for 2009. We encourage you to visit our website or pick up forms at church and make your pledge.

We trust God to be faithful and we trust that God will journey with us as we prepare a budget for 2009. Thank you to those who have submitted their pledges and to those who will over the coming weeks. May you and your family know the light of Christ's love and peace as we continue to live in a world of turmoil.


