One way we are specifically at work is the conversion of the first floor of the Elizabeth Inn shelter (where the MUST Administrative offices formally were) into a women's and family shelter. During our Board retreat in February I presented a proposal and they approved the work that is currently transforming this space into "home" for some 20 - 30 women and children each night. This will be a tremendous gift to them when it opens in July 2009.

Another gift is the support many in this congregation have offered for this work. And so this is as much a thank you article as a report. Tom Hunter graciously offered his lighting expertise as well as his ability to access lighting fixtures at good prices to light the first floor plus the second floor (the men's facility) eventually. Tom has worked with the contractor to make suggestions and improvements in the plan we developed. Fred Massey led a team on June 6 to frame walls in the facility. Led by Fred, Ben Frost, Hale Sanders, Al Jones, Roger Motter, Mark Childs, John Garner, and Ellis Kilgore worked that morning to frame up walls so that the project would continue on schedule. They were assisted ably by a saw loaned by Al Fey.

I will borrow some words from Fred in giving thanks for this work and for the many ministries that work to meet the needs of this faith community and the communities we serve. I feel privileged to be associated with such a caring group of men, women and children who give their time to help those less fortunate.

CONGREGATIONAL NURSES CORNER

Nancy Certain, RN, presents this article in a 5-part series on alcohol dependency:



Unfortunately, in this enlightened day and age, we as a society remain uninformed and ignorant of the disease of alcoholism and we hold alcohol dependent people as "weak," "personality deficient," "moody," "immature," "anxious," "miserable," "deviant." We shun them, we fire them, we leave them, we hide their disease and we don't talk about it. What we fail to do is understand that alcoholism is a disease for which the victim has no control, whose entire, internal cellular structure has changed to the point where it cannot survive without alcohol.

Scientists are learning more and more every day about the progression of this disease, what actually happens in the alcohol dependent person's brain and which new treatment approaches are dramatically improving the chances of diagnosis and cure. This is a new age of discovery and we cannot continue with our old ideas about the nature of this disease.

We as individuals are all touched in some way by alcoholism: aunt, uncle, brother, sister, parent, child, spouse, friend. Factual knowledge about alcoholism must be the foundation of any prevention effort. We cannot afford to wait for physicians to be educated, federal government programs to be realigned, treatment programs to be modified and laws to be changed. We know that alcohol dependent people are not morally or psychologically defective people, but innocent victims of a chronic and progressive disease. All who understand the disease should join forces to enlighten others.

Stewardship of Environment

I awoke early on a spring morning at Honey Creek and dressed to go to morning Eucharist. As I walked across the beautifully wooded area, I noticed movement on the ground. As I looked closer, there were many small hermit crabs scurrying around looking for their next meal, although it seemed like they were saying “good morning.” I walked into the chapel to find others praying and waiting for Eucharist to begin. I looked up to see a breathtaking view of the sunrise with hues of yellow and orange brightly shining on the table of God. I continued to be in awe of the magnificent background God had provided us for this morning service. This environment was perfection.

The *stewardship of environment* is one that touches so many aspects of our senses, our lives and the wonderful planet we live on. Let us ponder on the who, what, where, why and how of our environment.

First, *who* refers to all that make our environment beautiful, cluttered, invigorating or however we perceive it. At Saint Catherine’s, we have people who provide their time and talent to keep the grounds beautiful. When you walk up to the church on Sunday, do you think about who is doing all this? What about the physical building we gather in on Sundays and other days during the week? Who insures that the church is clean, the roof is not leaking and the windows are clean? Who keeps the lawns mown and the flowers planted? *Who* cares for your environment?

What is our environment? This can be many things – where we live, where we work, where we pray or where we play. Environment can also be those people we work with, people we socialize with, our families and our church families. We listen to the voices of our talented choir, but how often do we stop to appreciate all that they sacrifice to practice and make those lovely sounds that so enhance the environment of our worship? This can be said of so many of our ministries: altar guild, lay readers, outreach and more. *What* do you do to make your environment better?

Where is our environment? I think that it is where we are at that point in time. Are we deep in prayer, resting or working? There

are so many aspects that contribute to “our” environment and to coin an old phrase, “we need to take time to smell the roses”. *Where* is your environment and are you taking that time to smell the roses?

Why should we be aware of our environment? Our environment determines many facets of our lives, such as the safety of our home, the safety of our vehicle, the cleanliness of the air we breathe, the quality of the water we drink, the beauty of nature, our relation to others and our relation to God. *Why* is it important to you?

How can we act on our environment? This is a question for each us to consider in relation to our environment and to the gifts God has provided us. This is like Pentecost, although we are not speaking in tongues, we each have gifts that allow us to care for the various aspects in unison. This allows us to simultaneously care for the environment with like purpose and for the benefit of all. *How* can I make the environment better?

We at Saint Catherine’s have beauty that encompasses all these aspects of environment. As we walk up to the church we see an awesome great oak. We walk into the church and see the baptismal font with the artful water flowing into it. We look up and see the suspended Cross with background of sky and trees. The most exciting gift is when we enter and find our wonderful greeters providing visitors and parishioners with the gift of invitation. The children, running, smiling and laughing, provide us with joy and refreshment. The youth and teens active in our services provide us with hope for the future. Our teachers and preachers bring words of wisdom and comfort. We are so fortunate to have the blessing of such a special environment. How will you assist in maintaining the environment in your home, your church, your community and your planet?

Prayer for Stewardship: *O merciful Creator, your hand is open wide to satisfy the need of every living creature: Make us always thankful for your loving providence; and grant that we, remembering the account that we must one day give, may be faithful stewards of your good gifts; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, forever and ever. 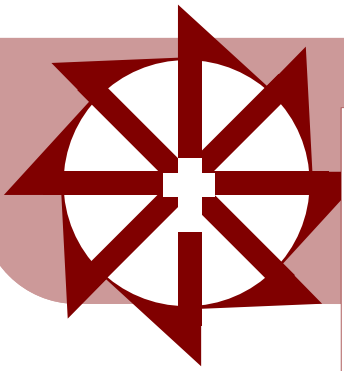
WELCOME
